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The Courage of Joshua

UNDISMAYED! Unafraid!
How Joshua's courage heartens
us today!

The story of Joshua is one that touches the heartstrings to call forth some very deep notes of response. Originally his name was Oshea. To him was given the honor of close personal attendance upon the lonely and majestic leader and law-giver, Moses, as young Timothy waited upon the Apostle Paul.

Apparently Joshua went farther with Moses into the mount, when the tables of the law were being received, and met him earlier upon his return, than anyone else. Together they questioned the meaning of the noise that came wafted to them from afar (Ex. 32:17) and young Joshua was there to share the heartbreaks of Moses as the significance of the idolatrous calf worship dawned upon them. Would not such hours deepen and prepare the future leader for the burden that should some day be his?

Joshua would be near Moses in other hours of stress. When the vast host of Israel murmured for flesh and for bread, he would be near. He would hear Moses' promise of flesh by evening time, and bread to the full in the morning. He would see the faith of the great man of God answered by the winds bringing the flocks of quails, and the appearance of manna as dew upon the ground. He would hear the distressing cry for water in the desert.

He would hear the calm statements of Moses that the murmuring was not against him, but against the Lord, and thus learn the leader's great secret of realizing he was but a tool in the purposes of God—the responsibility resting upon Another, who never failed. He would see the rock in Horeb smitten, and the waters come gushing out. No wonder his faith grew.

When the forces of Amalek, grandson of Esau, came to fight against Israel in Rephidim it was to Joshua that Moses turned, with instructions to choose out

men, and lead these forces in the warfare against Amalek down in the valley, while Moses prevailed, hands extended, upon the mountain top. Joshua would later hear the story of those hands held steady, by the assistance of Aaron and Hur, until the going down of the sun. Thus he would learn confidence for future battles, remembering victory is not by might nor by power, but "by my Spirit, saith the Lord."

When Moses chose out twelve spies to send into Canaan to view the land, Joshua was one of the twelve. Even as he sent them forth he seemed to recognize the spirit and and possibly foresaw the destiny of this young man, for it was at this time that his name was changed by Moses from Oshea (Num. 13:16) to Joshua, which means Deliverer, or Saviour. Moses' confidence was not misplaced. On the return of the spies, all admitted the desirability of the land, yet ten had no faith to enter it, and indeed these never did again. It was Joshua, with Caleb, who was probably an older man, who rent their clothes in dismay at the unbelieving report, bringing, "The Lord will bring us into this land. They are bread for us. Their defence is departed from them." As reward for their courageous words, the congregation was (Continued on Page 7)

"Like Precious Faith"

What would happen to us and to the needy world if we should get to the place where we really believed God? May God give us the desire to get to this place. Faith is a tremendous power, an inward mover. I am convinced that we have not yet seen all that God has for us, but if we shall only move on in faith we shall see the greater works.

When I was a little boy I remember asking my father for a pennyworth of something or other. He did not give it to me, so I sat down by his side and every now and again I would just quietly say, "Father!" He would appear to take no notice of me, but now and again I would touch him ever so gently and say, "Father!" My mother said to him, "Why don't you answer the child?" My father replied, "I have done so, but he won't accept my answer." Still I sat on, and occasionally I would touch him and say ever so quietly, "Father!" If he went out into the garden I followed him and occasionally I would touch his sleeve and say, "Father! Father!" Do you think I ever went away without the accomplishment of my desire? No, not once.

We need the same importunity as we go to God. We have the blessed assurance that if we ask anything according to His will He heareth us, and if we know that He hear us, whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of Him. Do you go to Him for heart purity? It is His will that you should receive, and if you ask in faith you can know that you have the petition that you desire of Him. Do you desire that Christ should dwell in your heart by faith? That is in accordance with His will. Ask and ye shall receive. Do you desire that the might of God's Spirit shall accompany your ministry? That is according to the will of God. Continue in the presence of your heavenly Father, quietly reminding Him that this is what you desire, and He will not fail to give you the exceeding abundantly above all you ask or think. He will fill you with rivers—the blessed rivers of the Spirit—and flowing from the midst of you they will be blessings to all that are around.

In the introduction to his second epistle Peter addresses "them that have obtained like precious faith with us." It is written, "They that trust in the Lord shall be as Mount Zion which cannot be removed." Have you this faith of divine origin

springing up in your heart? It will make you steadfast and unmovable. This faith, this confidence, this trust in God, will have a transforming power; changing and transforming spirit, soul, and body, sanctifying the entire being.

"Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." It is God coming in by His Word and laying the solid foundation. Faith is like dynamite which bursts up the old life and nature by the power of God, and brings the almighty power of God into the life. This substance will diffuse through the whole being, bringing everything else into insignificance. The Word of God is formed within the temple. Jeremiah spoke of the Word as a "fire within." It is a power stronger than granite that is able to resist the mightiest pressure the devil can bring against it. Faith counts on God's coming forth to confound the enemy. Faith counts on the display of God's might, when it is needful for Him to come forth in power.

In these eventful days we must not be content with a mere theory of faith, but must have this almighty and precious faith within us so that we may move from the ordinary into the extraordinary. We must expect Him to come forth in power through us for the deliverance of others. Peter spoke of it as "like precious faith." It is a like kind to that which Abraham had—the very faith of God. When Peter and John said to the lame man, Such as we have we give thee. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk, there was a manifestation of the same faith that Abraham had. It is this like precious faith God wants us to have.

In the former days the prophets received the Holy Spirit in a certain measure, but the Holy Spirit was given to the Lord Jesus Christ without measure. Did not He give the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost in this same measureless measure? That is His thought for you and me. Since I received the mighty Baptism in the Holy Spirit God has flooded my life with His power. From time to time there have been wonderful happenings—to Him be all the glory. Faith in God will bring the operation of the Spirit and we'll have the divine power flooding the human vessel and flowing out in blessing to others.

Faith is made in hard places when we are at wit's-end corner, and there seems no way out of our adversity. David said at one time, "The sorrows of death com-

passed me, and the floods of ungodly men made me afraid. The sorrows of hell compassed me about." He tells us, "In my distress I called upon the Lord, and cried unto my God: he heard my voice out of his temple . . . he bowed the heavens . . . and came down." Faith cries to God in the place of testing. It is in these places that God enlarges us and brings us forth into a large place, to prove Himself the God of deliverances, the One who is indeed our helper.

I remember in the year 1920 after a most distressing voyage I went straight from the ship on which I had been traveling, to a meeting. As I entered the building a man fell down across the doorway in a fit. The Spirit of the Lord was upon me and I commanded the demon to leave. Some years later I visited this same assembly, and I ventured to ask if anyone remembered the incident. A man stood up and I told him to come to the platform. He told me that on that day he had been delivered by the name of Jesus and had not had a fit since. We read in Acts 10:38 that "God hath anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil; for God was with him." God wants us to have this same anointing and same power through the indwelling Christ and through a living faith. It was the Lord Himself who told us before He went away, "These signs shall follow them that believe. In my name they shall cast out demons . . . they shall lay hands on the sick and they shall recover." God is waiting to manifest His divine power through believers.

I remember a man coming to me suffering with cancer, who said he had been twelve years in pain. The power of the Lord was present to heal, and that night he came back to the meeting with all his sores dried up.

In this second epistle of Peter we further read, "According to his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue: whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature." Believe the record. His divine power has provided this life and godliness and virtue. Believe for the virtue of the Lord to be so manifested through your body that as men touch you they are healed. Believe for the current to go through you to others. It is amazing what can happen when some necessity arises when there is no time to pray, only to act. It is in such times of necessity that the Holy Ghost comes forth to act. We must so live in God that the Spirit of God can operate through us. I remember being in one place where there were 6,000 people outside the building where we were preaching. Many of them

were in chairs, waiting for hands to be laid on them and the prayer of faith to be offered. Oh for the virtue that flowed from Christ to touch the needy everywhere!

A woman said to Christ one time, "Blessed is the womb that bare thee, and the paps which thou hast sucked." But he answered, "Yea rather, blessed are they hath hear the word of God, and keep it." It is through the hearing of the Word of God that faith comes, and faith brings the omnipotence of God to helpless souls and brings the virtue of Christ to the sick and to the needy. Do you remember how they asked the Lord, "What shall we do that we might work the works of God?" Jesus answered and said unto them, "This is the work of God that ye believe on him whom he hath sent." He further said, "The works that I do shall ye do also: and greater works than these shall ye do; because I go unto my Father." There is nothing impossible to faith.

When I was in Orebro 12 years ago I ministered to a girl who was twelve years' old, and blind. When I last went to Orebro they told me that she had had perfect sight from that day. The Lord Himself challenges us to believe Him when He says, "Have faith in God." "Verily, I say unto you, That whosoever shall say unto this mountain, Be thou removed, and be thou cast into the sea; and shall not doubt in his heart, but shall believe that those things which he saith shall come to pass; he shall have whatsoever he saith." Did you get that? "He shall have whatsoever he saith." When you speak in faith your desire is an accomplished thing. Our Lord further said, "Therefore I say unto you, What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them."

In one place a man said to me, "You helped a good many today, but you have not helped me." I said, "What is the trouble?" He said, "I cannot sleep, and I am losing my reason." I said to him, "Believe." And then I told him to go home and sleep, and I told him I would believe God. He went home and his wife said to him, "Well, did you see the preacher?" And he said, "He helped everyone but me." However, he fell asleep. His wife said, "I wonder if it is all right." Morning, noon, and night he was still asleep, but he woke bright and happy, rested and restored. What had brought about this restoration? Faith in God! "He shall have whatsoever he saith."

Have you received this "like precious faith"? If so, deal bountifully with the oppressed. God has called us to loose the bands of wickedness, undo the heavy burden, let the oppressed go free, and break the yokes that the devil has put upon them. Pray in faith. Remember he that asketh receiveth. Ask and it shall be

given you. Live for God. Keep clean and plans. Glorify Him in the establishment of holy. Live under the unction of the Holy His blessing upon the people, and in see-Spirit. Let the mind of Christ be yours ing God's glory manifested in the midst. so that you live in God's desires and Amen.



A Message in a Known Tongue

Under the mighty anointing of the Spirit, Miss Helen Armentrout, a Third Year student in Southwestern Bible School, at Enid, Oklahoma, sang a message from God in a language unknown to all present except one, Miss Mollie Baird, a teacher in the school, who graduated from Central Bible Institute in 1925, and spent five years as a missionary in northern India. She understood the message, and said it was in perfect Urdu, the official court language of much of India, and spoken by multitudes, and especially in northern India. The Hindus study Urdu in the schools and those who take government positions must be acquainted with it.

It was at a reception given by Mrs. Annie Bamford, Dean of Women, to the Faculty and the Senior Class, which each year now for six years, has been held near the end of the school year. This year it was held on the evening of April 17. There had been songs and instrumental numbers and speeches, and then Sister Baird was asked to sing in one of the languages of India. "Tell Me the Story of Jesus" was the song she chose. This touched many hearts, although we were not able to understand the words. But one was moved more than any of the rest. It was Sister Armentrout,

who has dedicated her life to missionary work in India, and who hopes to go forth to this field of labor this summer. It has been evident to all the teachers and students that the Lord has been preparing her for this work, and the Lord has put it on the hearts of some of His people to contribute to her outfit and to her fare across the seas.

As soon as Sister Baird finished her song, Sister Armentrout in a sweet clear voice sang a song in Urdu, both words and melody given by the Spirit. This was not interpreted, but other messages and interpretations came forth as a wave of glory swept over all who were present. One was more visibly moved than the rest. This one was Sister Baird. For some time she was too much overcome to speak, but when she regained control of her emotions she told us that the message was in perfect Urdu, and that she understood it, and that it was meant for her personally. Later, on the same night Sister Armentrout, prostrate under "the power" in one of the dormitories gave forth a much longer message in the same language. Most of those present said that they had never been nearer the portals of glory than they were in this gathering.

I thought at first that Miss Armentrout had learned the song of Miss Baird, but I learned later that this was not the case, and the sister who gave forth the message says that it came to her unexpectedly. I report this case to our brethern who may be among scoffers who cast in their teeth that real languages that can be understood are never spoken by Pentecostal people. Praise God this is only one instance out of hundreds and thousands.

Communism in Africa

False Prophets and True

On the occasion of a campaign against the Syrians, Jehoshaphat, king of Judah, who had hitherto walked with the Lord, made the mistake of becoming unequally yoked with Ahab, king of Israel, and together they went up to battle. Jehoshaphat suggested that they make inquiry of the Lord. With one accord the four hundred prophets of Ahab declared that the campaign would be prosperous. Jehoshaphat evidently had no witness to these prophecies, and said, "Is there not a prophet of the Lord besides that we might inquire of him?" Ahab admitted that there was one more prophet, Micaiah, the son of Imlah, but he said, "I hate him; for he doth not prophesy good concerning me, but evil." It is the old, old story, the false prophets have popularity aplenty, but God's true prophets usually have the portion of the Prophet of all prophets, they are despised and rejected of men.

The Veil Lifted

Micaiah foretold the result of the battle; all Israel would become as sheep without a shepherd, for the engagement would involve the death of their master, King Ahab. This prophet then told of a vision he had been given—a vision that has its parallel in the first chapter of Job. He had seen the Lord upon the throne and all the hosts of heaven standing by Him. The Lord knew all about Ahab, who, stirred by his wicked consort, Jezebel, has sold himself to do evil, and Micaiah heard Him say, "Who shall persuade Ahab, that he may go up and fall at Ramoth-gilead?" The prophet told the kings, "And there came forth a spirit, and stood before the Lord, and said, I will persuade him. . . . I will be a lying spirit in the mouth of all his prophets."

A True Prophecy

The answer the Lord gave to the spirit was, "Thou shalt persuade him, and prevail also; go forth, and do so." After recounting the vision this man of God told Ahab, "Now therefore, the Lord hath put a lying spirit in the mouth of all these thy prophets." Ahab discredited what Micaiah had to say for were there not four hundred prophets prophesying prosperity against this one man foretelling evil, and so he committed Micaiah to the prison to be given the bread and water of affliction. Nevertheless Micaiah's prophecy came true. Ahab was persuaded by the lying spirit speaking through the mouth of his prophets and went up to Ramoth-gilead, where he was killed by an

arrow when a certain man "drew a bow at a venture." Many arrows reach places God designs for them through bows drawn at a venture.

On to Armageddon

There is an immensely practical message in this to us. The apostle John warns us, "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world." He informs us that these false prophets are filled with the spirit of Antichrist, the spirit of error; they are of the world, and the world hears them. These prophets do not confess "Jesus Christ come in flesh." Alford tells us that this last term implies the pre-existence and incarnation of Christ. These many false prophets unanimously deny that the holy thing born of the virgin Mary was indeed the Son of God and God the Son manifesting Himself in flesh. The inspired Paul further warns us of these wicked spirits that are dwelling in heavenly places, and he tells us to put on the whole armor of God that we may be able to withstand them. As the days of the great tribulation approach the spirit of Antichrist will seek to possess men as that lying spirit possessed those four hundred prophets, and just as they persuaded Ahab to go up to Ramoth-gilead to meet his destruction, so will these lying spirits eventually seek to lead the kings and rulers of earth and their armies to go up to Armageddon to meet a similar doom. Back of Bolshevism, as we see it in Russia and other lands; or Fascism, as we see it in Italy; of the Nazi movement in Germany; and of the militant nationalism seen in almost every land, are evil spirits who are bent on the destruction of the souls they dupe.

Demon Possession

During the past few days I have been reading a new book entitled, *Revelation, The Book With A Blessing*. The writer, Samuel F. Hurnard, interprets the Book somewhat differently from most. He thinks that we may see many of the things in the first part of the book of Revelation take place in our day. Concerning the locusts that come forth from the abyss described in the 9th chapter, he states that he believes that these will be a legion of demons. "Men who worship the Beast will be seized with the horrible madness of demon possession, till 'they gnaw their tongues for pain' and 'shall seek death and shall not find it.' What a reign of terror that will be! Already

cases of those addicted to Spiritism, who have fought against the overmastering passions and tyranny of some demon to whom they have subjected themselves, till some have become insane, warn us how real and frightful this 'Woe' will be. Dr. Nevius, for many years a missionary in China, relates how a demon, after possessing a man, compels him to yield to and worship him. Torment of the most afflicting kind is visited upon the demoniac until his will is completely surrendered, and he becomes not only a private, but a public worshiper of the demon. 'Before this full surrender of the will is made, if he had worshiped a demon, he would scarcely have owned it except with shame. Now he boasts of his power, and professes to heal diseases by the demon's aid.'

A Faithful Warning

Mr. Hurnard further says, "In order that men and women may not come under their awful power and partake of their doom, the Bible gives repeated warnings of the danger, and absolutely forbids touching Spiritism in any form. Deut. 18:10-12 should be studied, while in Lev. 20:6, 27 we read, 'And the soul that turneth after such as have familiar spirits, and after wizards, to go a whoring after them, I will even set my face against that soul, and will cut him off from among his people. A man also, or a woman that hath a familiar spirit, or that is a wizard, shall surely be put to death.' . . . As we read and think of these things, we should claim the protection of the shed blood of the Lord Jesus. Spirit influence is all around us in these days. Only the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit and the covenanted protection of Christ can keep us from falling. His precious shed blood both seals the covenant and is a sign of His victory over Satan and all the powers of evil. He is our refuge and our strength. But we must ever be on guard, for Satan comes too often as an angel of light."

Truth or Error

We need to heed the warning of the apostle Paul, "Neither give place to the devil." Eph. 4:27. There must not be an inch of ground in our spirits, or souls, or bodies in which the enemy can get a foothold to place his evil seed. Like the Master we must be able to say, "Satan cometh and hath nothing in me," because every bit of territory has been given up to God; that whereas once as sinners we were yielding to Satan, now as saints we are yielding completely to God. There will be no room for darkness if we are filled with light, and the Scriptures tell us, "The entrance of thy word giveth light." God warns us that those who receive not the love of the truth, that they might be saved, will, like Ahab of old,

be sent a strong delusion that they might believe a lie, that they all might be damned who believe not the truth but have pleasure in unrighteousness. But, thank God, there will be no room for the spirit of error if we are filled with the Spirit of Truth, and that is why it is so important in these days to be filled with the Spirit in Pentecostal fullness, and to have a thorough knowledge of the Word of God.

Watch

Our Lord warned the church of Sardis, "If therefore thou shalt not watch, I will come on thee as a thief, and thou shalt not know what hour I will come upon thee." Mr. Hurnard tells us that "the city of Sardis was built on a plateau, 1,500 feet above the valley, with precipitous cliffs almost all around it. The position was well-nigh impregnable. When Cyrus came with his army and besieged it, one of his soldiers noticed a man descending by secret steps, cut in the face of the cliff. One by one the soldiers of Cyrus ascended these steps in silence in the darkness of night and the city was surprised and captured. A similar experience befell Sardis when Antiochus the Great took it in 218 B. C., surreptitiously, after a twelve months' siege. A sure-footed Cretan scaled the heights and led the way. Again the city was captured. With what a thrill, then, must these significant words of solemn import have fallen upon the ears of this church." We have a wily enemy and we need to watch. In this Laodicean age our eyes must be constantly anointed with the heavenly eye-salve—the blessed Holy Ghost. We need also the repeated renewing of the heavenly fire of the Holy Spirit lest we receive the solemn judgment of the Master, "Because thou art lukewarm . . . I will spue thee out of my mouth." "Watch ye therefore: for ye know not when the master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cockcrow, or in the morning: lest coming suddenly he find you sleeping. And what I say unto you I say unto all, Watch." Mark 13: 35-37.

Not According to Christ

Herr Haecker is described in the *Dawn* as the most important Roman Catholic writer at the present time in Germany. He has recently said, "If Martin Luther had been burned as John Hus had been a few centuries earlier, what a fiery act of love that would have been; of love to God, of love to the Church, of love towards Christendom, of love towards the Roman empire within the German nation, of love towards the German people, of love towards the arch-heretic himself! For perhaps he would have died in grace."

Our Lord Jesus instructed us, "Love your enemies." He did not say, "Burn them."

A Review of Current Life and Thought in the Light of Scripture

A Parliamentary Prayer Meeting

According to the *Elim Evangelist*, a weekly prayer meeting is held in the English houses of Parliament. The meeting is of an informal character—anyone present may lead out in prayer. The first one to arrive becomes the leader of the meeting.

These prayer meetings may have more to do with the safety and stability of England than many people realize. More things are wrought by prayer than the world dreams of.

The Return of the Duel

According to *Time*, the governments of Prussia, Baden, and Bavaria have rescinded all Republican laws against the bloody rapier duels of the German student corps. Wrote the *Volkischer Beobachter*: "These measures will restore the sound, healthy idea that a man should take a weapon in his hand to avenge an insult instead of going before a judge and having his honor measured by legal paragraphs, as under the Republic."

This is a movement in the opposite direction from the Sermon on the Mount.

Russia's Four-Horsemen Stamp

"Recently the Soviet government issued a special postage stamp to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the formation of the Red army's cavalry. Four horsemen appear on the stamp. A flag carried by the leading horseman is blood red—the flag of Russia's Red army and the emblem of world communism. A line, apparently marking the pathways, is likewise red on the original stamp—the red path of God."

Writes Dr. Bauman in *Prophecy*, "Who familiar with the Bible can look upon this stamp and fail to think of the four horsemen of Rev. 6 starting forth on their ride to judgment and death?"

Antichrist's Philosophy

Friedrich Nietzsche was a philosopher who exerted a great influence upon the intellectuals of Germany with his teaching about the "Superman" and his exaltation of power as the greatest blessing to be sought. He was thoroughly Anti-Christian. Here is one of the statements in his book, *The Antichrist*: "This is the undying denunciation of Christianity which I shall write upon all walls, wherever there are walls. I have letters that will burn even upon the eyeballs of the blind. I call Christianity the one great curse, the one intrinsic depravity, the one black impulse of resentment, for which no subterfuge is too vile, or too furtive, or too underhand, or too mean. I say this

thing is the one indelible blot upon the achievement of man."

This is the kind of teaching that will be heard during the reign of Antichrist. Rev. 13:5-7.

Incidentally it might be said that the wages poor Nietzsche received for serving the devil so faithfully was that he became insane in his last days.

Jewish Lawyer Accepts Christ

The *Alliance Weekly* tells of the conversion of a young Jewish lawyer in Western Canada. Writes Pastor G. A. Stitch, "He is considered the youngest criminal lawyer admitted to the bar in Canada. At the age of nineteen he was a full-fledged lawyer." Within three weeks of his conversion the young man entered a Bible training school. In a recent letter the young convert said, "Yesterday I wore a gown and addressed the Supreme Court. Today I wear an apron and wash dishes for Christ Jesus, praise the Lord! I read God's precious Word constantly. Today I derived much joy from chapter 28 of the Book of Job. How true! All our great learnings and sciences and achievements of mind, philosophy, ethics, and fantastic theologies turn to dust before our eyes, but 'the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom, and to depart from evil is understanding.' This is eternal."

Doctors Protest Against Atheism

"Someone has said that the Soviet's studied instilling of Atheism into infant minds is the most wicked thing that has been done on earth since Calvary," says the *Dawn*. "A remarkable protest is lodged (in *Psychiatrisch-Neurologische Wochenschrift*, No. 49) by 83 German neurologists and insanity specialists: 'In the present lamentable struggle of political parties over the schools, attempts are being made, in a folly truly irresponsible, to shake the foundations of Christianity. We, the undersigned insanity and nerve specialists, who have daily opportunities to look into the deep abysses of psychic need and suffering, earnestly warn against allowing the belief in Christ even in the least degree to lapse in the hearts of our youth, since this is the real anchor in the storms of our time. The Christian religion is now and will remain the philosophy, the psychology, the ethic, the socialism. Therein are we psychiatrists and neurologists at one with the greatest and noblest among the spirits whom the German people are proud to name as her sons and who have taught us to recognize the nature and ends of Christianity in its infinite wisdom, truth, freedom, and strength.'"

Divine Healing Meetings

Meetings for the teaching and practice of divine healing are most important to the church, and should have the hearty support of everyone who is interested in the welfare of the church. However, to be a blessing to the church, such meetings must *succeed*. If forty persons present themselves for healing and three of them only are healed, it is fine for those three, but it is bad for the church and for the work of God in that community. If, however, forty persons present themselves for healing and only three of them fail to be healed, this is bad for those three but it is fine for the church. A church where such successful Divine Healing meetings are common will be the talk of the town and the whole country around; it will have to pull down its walls and build greater; it will have a mass of interested people to hear the gospel.

Therefore everyone who loves the church and is connected with the Divine Healing meeting should make it his serious business to make the meeting succeed.

I. The candidate for healing should take careful steps to rid himself of those things of the flesh in his life which may hinder or prevent his being healed; and diligently seek to come into such nearness to God that faith for his healing will possess him. Persons who come for healing and who, because of their careless disregard of the essentials of healing are not healed, in doing so injure the cause of Christ.

II. The minister guiding the service not only should take the meeting very seriously, but he should give expert advice to all who present themselves for healing, and take great pains to let no hindrance to the success of the meeting be found in himself. He should approach the meeting from his closet, having used such means of grace as he has found best calculated to bring him into the closest touch with God—if not fasting, at least, surely, careful abstemiousness in the matter of food as well as the other things that please the natural man. He should pray with great earnestness and divine compassion for each candidate, dealing with him patiently and with painstaking regard to his individual needs and states, both physically and spiritually. Persons seeking *salvation* are given this kind of attention. We pray with them and for them, exhort them, instruct them, and encourage them, thinking nothing of the passing minutes or hours, faithfully hovering about them until their new names

are written down in glory and the witness of the Spirit makes their faces shine and their hearts leap for joy. It is the same with those who seek the Baptism. I am convinced that if the candidates for salvation and the Baptism were given only the "lick-and-a-promise" care and attention that is given to candidates for Divine Healing, far fewer people would be saved and filled than now are.

III. The members of the church should make it their solemn and special business to make the Divine Healing meetings a success. Often it is found that a minister carrying on a Divine Healing meeting is surrounded by a houseful of saints of whom nothing more hopeful can be said than that they are curiously waiting to see what the pastor or evangelist can do in the way of praying for the sick. No evangelist could succeed in holding a revival if the church treated him so. The church must get under the burden, must work, reconsecrate their lives, give themselves to prayer, live lives of holiness before the world, and generally exert themselves if they are going to do their part in making a meeting a success. The church must do the same with the Divine Healing meeting. If they do not do so, and the Divine Healing meeting results in most of the candidates for healing remaining unhealed, the membership may safely conclude that they put their pastor up in the forefront of the battle and retired from him, allowing him to be defeated, and the cause of Christ to be seriously hindered.

To illustrate my meaning: I was once in a meeting where a lady evangelist was praying for a vast multitude of sick folk. They were brought on to the platform in assorted groups, seven at a time and seated in seven chairs. The evangelist prayed until she was exhausted and finally fell in a faint of exhaustion and had to be carried out. At the time she was praying for a row of seven deaf-mute women. She had prayed for six and they had been healed. One was left. I was the evangelist's only assistant at the moment. I had never prayed alone for a deaf-mute. It seemed quite an undertaking; but she looked so forlorn that I prayed for her. She was healed and spoke and heard. Why? My credit? No. Many hundreds of people were praying and expecting and had been doing so for hours, until there was enough power to heal anyone if they would but yield themselves to Him for healing. This should be so in your assembly. If the membership would rally

round the pastor and come fasting and praying, getting under the burden of the meeting and mightily lifting, they would find that God's power is just the same today. Cancers would be dried up overnight, goiters would vanish like the dew before the morning sun, bed-ridden folk would receive strength to arise and leave the church on their own power. It only needs testing to prove that what I say is true in your assembly.

God sometimes heals a sinner. It is a shame however to approach Him and even ask Him for healing, knowing that we are living in sin. We instruct seekers for salvation most carefully and persistently that if they would get saved they must cleanse their hands and purify their hearts. We tell them they must repent, that is, turn from sin and self-rule to righteousness and God's rule, and do it without mental reservation or any exception. We labor with them and pray for them until they do this, and then we rejoice with them over their salvation, and the angels of heaven rejoice with us. The seekers for healing should be similarly instructed.

Successful healing meetings held often and regularly in a church will surely put that church "on the map" as we say. God will be glorified in His people, and multitudes now in the valley of decision will climb the high hills to God's righteousness and favor. On the other hand Divine Healing meetings that fail, in which a large percentage of the candidates for healing are not healed, such meetings having been advertised and looked forward to because of broad claims made, are a stench and a horror.

Let the candidates, the pastor, and the membership set out definitely and unitedly to have frequent and regular successful Divine Healing meetings, and God will bless their own hearts, heal the afflicted, and make the name of our Lord glorified.

Healed of Sclerosis of the Liver

I was a mocker and did not believe God was able to heal. Fourteen years I was sick and had a number of doctors, besides taking quantities of patent medicines. Six X-rays were taken; but I suffered on. For about five years I suffered intensely and could get no relief. An operation finally was advised as the only means of help. On March 20, 1928 they opened my body but found me beyond human help with sclerosis of the liver, that organ being three and half times as large as normal.

Before the operation I had opened my Bible at the 118th Psalm and read, "I shall not die but live, and declare the works of the Lord." I stood on these precious promises. My cousin, Mrs. Helen Kelly, came from Battle Creek. She had been wonderfully healed of an

inward goiter. She had told me of the Lord's healing but I couldn't believe. She told the doctors to take care of me just as if they expected me to get well, and that I would soon be all right. They said it would be a wonder if I ever came from under the effects of the ether; but they sent me to my room and gave me proper care. They said I could not possibly live over seventy-two hours. They called my loved ones to take a last look at me, but only allowed them to enter the room one at a time.

But God works in a mysterious way His wonders to perform. Oh hallelujah! I came out from under the ether and opened my Bible at the 23rd Psalm. I read it through, dwelling on the thought, "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, thou art with me. Thy rod and staff they comfort me." From that hour I began to mend. I had lost my sense of smell and taste and had to learn to walk. The church fasted and prayed for me. Today I am strong and well, have gained thirty-two pounds, and am walking by faith in His name. I am doing my own work and am ministering to the sick and needy as I can. I once was a scoffer but now I am a baptized saint. Praise the Lord! For good measure, so to say, the Lord threw in the healing of a stubborn case of constipation of twenty-three years standing.—(Mrs.) Anna Vandeventer, 2226 Kentucky Avenue, Joplin, Mo.

about to stone them, when the glory of the Lord suddenly appeared, quieting all. Then came the verdict of the Lord. None of that generation should enter in, save

only Caleb and Joshua. Forty years, a year for a day, would they wander in the wilderness. It was their children who would enter the land.

The forty years passed, and with them the people of that generation. Meanwhile the young Joshua was growing to years of experience and maturity under the leadership and companionship of the aging Moses.

Eventually came the noble farewell song of the great Moses, and his final instructions to the priesthood and to his beloved successor, Joshua. Full of stirring words of courage they were! How they would sink deep into the heart of Joshua, recalling to him the vast wealth of experience from which they were spoken.

Such a scene! Moses the aged! Joshua, the future leader! Let us eavesdrop a moment. "*Be strong and of a good courage. . . . Thou must go with this people unto the land. . . . The Lord doth go before thee. He will be with thee. He will not fail thee, neither forsake thee. Fear not, neither be dismayed.*" Ah, such words to bequeath as an inheritance! Then Moses ascended the lonely mount Nebo, in Moab's land, from whence we are told it is still literally possible, in that rare desert air, to see with the naked eye the far-spread stretches of the whole of the land of promise. There he died, and was buried at the hand of God.

So we are brought to the story of Joshua's own movements as leader, as recorded in the book called by his name. God spoke now to him. "Arise, go over this Jordan, thou and all this people. All the land shall be your coast. As I was with Moses, so will I be with thee. I will not fail thee nor forsake thee. Only be thou strong and very courageous." Yet again the divine call comes, "Have not I commanded thee? Be strong and of a good courage. Be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed."

Obediently, and without dismay, Joshua gave the command to prepare food, for, "Within three days ye shall pass over this Jordan to go in to possess the land." We read that when the feet of the priests that bare the sacred ark were dipped in the brim of the water, though the Jordan over flowed all his banks at harvest, yet the waters stood in an heap, (Josh. 3:15, 16) and all the people passed over! How great was that moment, after forty years of waiting!

Immediately before them arose the walls of the city of Jericho. But Joshua now well knew the God at whose commission he went forward. How faithful was that Lord who had bidden him not be dismayed! His spies were protected by Rahab and her scarlet cord. The old corn of the land replaced the manna of the desert. As Joshua actually stood by the Jericho walls, there appeared be-

fore him a Man with a drawn sword. "Art thou for us, or for our adversaries?" demanded Joshua. "As captain of the host of the Lord am I come," was the answer. "Loose thy shoe from off thy foot, for the place whereon thou standest is holy." And Joshua did so! Further instruction, with regard to encompassing the city walls, was given. These instructions obeyed, the walls of Jericho fell, and Israel walked into the city over the crumpled walls, every man straight before him. Modern excavators at the scene of ancient Jericho tell of evidence of the walls falling suddenly as if by an earthquake. Thus God gave them, at the hands of Joshua, city after city, as the land was possessed!

Be not dismayed! Be not afraid! Be strong and of a good courage! What wonderful words for us today. True, we cannot today walk for years as the associate of the great Moses, and learn his secrets of faith. Yet a greater than Moses is here! As Moses counselled young Joshua, so He will counsel us.

To the end Joshua was the courageous warrior, ever putting fresh heart into those about him. At the last, when he became of advanced years, the cry was still, "*There remaineth yet very much land to be possessed.*" "One man of you shall chase a thousand," he counselled. "No man hath been able to stand before you unto this day." Then he pleaded with them to love the Lord God. At the very last, as though he foresaw the old backslidings might recur in their numbers, he took his stand alone, if need be, in devotion to the Lord. They, if so they chose, might serve the gods on the other side of the flood; "but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord!" He won a reward, for we read, "Israel served the Lord all the days of Joshua, and all the days of the elders that overlived Joshua, which had known all the works of the Lord, which he had done for Israel." Joshua 24:31:

Thus the undismayed soul, who draws its courage and inspiration from our great Leader of the Lord's hosts, not only enters into God's good promises himself, but brings many others into so goodly an inheritance also. Undismayed! Courageous! Getting the mind of God, and obediently going forward despite swollen river, walled city, or giant opposers! May we of today, by God's grace, become such Joshua souls—strong to enable others, with us, to enter the deliverance and rest of the promised land!

The Gospel in Foreign Lands

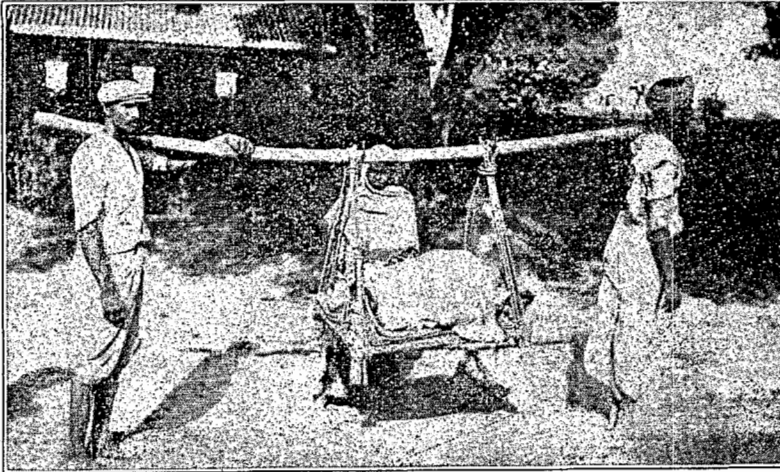
"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, . . . ye have done it unto me"

Brother and Sister Nicodem write from Rupaiddha, India: "God is blessing in our midst in a very real way these days. For weeks we have been crying to God for a real revival in our midst, not something worked up by man, but a stirring from the very depths that would bring lasting results with it. Since such a revival could not be started by man, we could only cry out to God to send the Holy Ghost in our midst to convict of sin and put a hunger in hearts. Praise God, that is what is happening; many of our boys have been definitely saved, others are tarrying for the Baptism with the Holy Spirit, and God is truly meeting hungry hearts. It is like a tonic to our own hearts and bodies, to see these precious souls getting through to God.

"I am sure those of you who see the accompanying picture will feel that you would not like to be carried to the hospital in this kind of an ambulance, however that is what is happening here. On this tiny rope bed, carried by two men, lies a little bundle of India's humanity, a tiny girl just ten years old. A few nights ago as we returned to the bungalow from our evening service we found a crowd had gathered and in the midst was this little girl, with a broken bleeding face. While out gathering cow dung for fuel, she had been kicked by a horse, cutting a great gash in the side of her face and knocking out several teeth. They brought her to us and we bathed her face and with the help of some sterilized carpenter pinchers, removed several teeth that were loosened, then wrapped her face up and sent her with one of our workers to the hospital in Nepal. We of course could not go with her ourselves as we are white and no white man may enter that country, and we knew her face must have stitches taken in it to close the wound. Our little girlie stood by watching the scene, with

tears in her eyes, and eventually ran into the bungalow, got her little dolly that had been sent all the way from America, and brought it out and laid it in the arms of the little sufferer. It was all she could do but she did it gladly and the little Indian girl went off to the hospital hugging the 'White Baba' to her bosom. Each day she had to be carried back and forth to have the sore dressed and this is the way she was carried.

"Pray for us. God is wonderfully pouring in His life these days and we are not expecting to leave India for furlough. Some of our friends have written that they thought we were in the home land but we want to assure you that we

Trials and Victories in the New Bible School at Unao, India

Sister Katherine Cooke, who has been assisting Miss Flint at the new Bible school at Unao for a time, writes:

"Miss Flint has started here in faith, but I can tell you she has had many hardships and still has. It will be impossible to stay in these rooms more than two weeks longer and she will have to move to Cawnpore and rent a house. I do hate to think of her living in this condition another cool season. There are fourteen rooms with a veranda running along on which the girls sleep. The rooms at present have no floors or windows, and absolutely no furniture. The girls' bedrooms of course will not need any furniture except their beds which are carried out every night on to the veranda, for they keep their few belongings in their tin boxes. But the class rooms must have desks and chairs and they should have a table in their dining room with chairs to sit on. They do not require many dishes, just their own enamel plate and drinking glass for they eat with their fingers. But they do need a proper kitchen and Indian stove. At present they cook between bricks in the open, and last week when it rained they had to move the bricks on to the veranda. The dirt floors are not safe for there is always the fear of scorpions and centipedes. It is much better to have cement floors.

"The room Miss Flint and I occupy is one of these dormitory rooms and the roof is not high enough to be safe for us from the sun. We have straw on the dirt floor and a straw mat on top of that and the white ants are plentiful. This small room serves as our bedroom, office, and study, and we have an old tent full of holes in which we eat and have meetings. Miss Flint had all classes in the tent but it is too hot now, so they have to have them in the girls' dining room. Five rooms are not even roofed and we use one of them for a bathroom. Of course it is quite an experience and we get lots of fun out of it. One can make light of it for a time, but after that it gets on one's nerves. The other night it rained heavily and came in at the holes which have been left for windows. Then in the morning when we went to bathe in our roofless bathroom, we found a mud puddle. We had to take bricks and standing on one throw the other in front of us until we had stepping stones to the washstand and water jug. The room we use is crowded now so we cannot possibly use it for a bathroom too, especially in this land.

"We are using one unfinished room—without roof—for a kitchen with just an Indian stove of mud and brick. The rain put the fire out several times, and then the other day we had a roast of goat meat on the fire and a jungle cat stole it off the fire. I do hope it got burned

good for the meat of course was very hot. We just had potatoes and bread for our dinner that day.

"Miss Flint will need all of these rooms next year, for she has thirteen students now and many more wanting to come. She is planning to have four beds in each room, and they must have two classrooms besides the dining room and a room for the matron and Indian teacher. She must have a good high wall around the place. Just now she only has a low temporary wall and several nights men have climbed over. Young women and girls have to be shut away in India to keep them safe. Miss Flint and whoever works with her should have a separate little house outside the walls for it is very trying to have to live in the boarding house, for their is no privacy and no quiet. Several of the girls are married and have had to bring their little babies with them, so it is either one or another crying night and day. There is a woman to care for the babies while the mothers are in classes and studying, but the rest of the time the mothers care for them themselves. These young women are very anxious to take Bible training for if they are on an outstation with their husbands, they too can work among the women of the villages; and if they are on the main station with the missionary, they can be very helpful in going out with the missionary to the Zenanas.

"I thought if you knew some of these things you would be able to pray for this first A.-G. Pentecostal Bible School and perhaps get some folks interested. It is most necessary for we need Bible women badly and it would seem that money spent in enabling bright, intelligent, consecrated Christian girls to receive good Bible training would be money well spent and in time to come would bring good returns. The Lord has certainly set His seal upon it and is working in hearts and blessing in a wonderful way. The other night we had a glorious time in the evening prayer meeting, and one girl was so sweetly baptized in the Spirit and others who had received before were freshly anointed and others who had not made a complete consecration before, were greatly under conviction and took a definite step forward. Last Saturday night I had had a touch of the sun and was suffering so with my head that instead of going to the evening meeting in the tent I went to bed. I fell asleep and dreamed that I was with a company of people on the road somewhere, and all of a sudden someone exclaimed, 'Oh, the glory, the glory!' and I thought the whole place was lighted up and I began to shake and ascend. One foot was entirely off the floor and the other just held on to the earth by one toe, but presently that too let go and I felt such a wonderful happiness in my soul and there was a mighty rushing wind

which swept us along. Then I woke up and heard such a wonderful sound coming from the tent. I looked at my watch and it was midnight, but the folks in the tent were having such a glorious time they did not stop until 2:30 a. m. Several nearly got through to their Baptism and there was such an atmosphere of glory and victory that Miss Flint said it seemed as though the Lord would come. Then again Sunday morning in the morning service, the power came down and the Lord was very near. So we really feel that He is going to see this thing through in spite of the depression."

Stillness of Spirit

The still small voice of God can be heard only by the stilled spirit. Elijah was disturbed by the turn affairs had taken after he had called down fire from heaven, destroyed the prophets of Baal, and prayed down a great rain. Jezebel the wicked queen threatened to slay him, and he ran for his life. In 1 Kings 19:4 we find him under the juniper tree begging to die.

God saw the dear man's need. Instead of granting his request, He began to feed him up again. An angel prepared a meal, and the prophet was awakened from sleep. He ate the lunch and went to sleep again. The angel prepared a second meal and aroused the prophet, who again partook of the food and then started for the mount of God. He could have done the trip easily in ten or twelve days, but forty days of travel had to be undertaken before he reached the spot.

After his arrival the Lord said, "What doest thou here, Elijah?" The prophet's spirit was wounded and he poured out his complaint. The voice said, "What doest thou here, Elijah?" Again the answer of complaint, but there followed a new commission with the assurance that he was not the only remaining man of God, but that there were still seven thousand true to their Lord. Thus the prophet was quietened and strengthened and sent forth again in the service of the Lord.

What a lesson for us as Pentecostal Christians. How prone we are to consider ourselves filled just because we have the blessed manifestations common to the present outpouring. If we would confess the real truth however, we would admit that power to accomplish things for God is none too plentiful. We may shout and we may shake, but are devils cast out thereby? Do we not need to learn that stillness of spirit clarifies the atmosphere and enables God to speak to us? Then we would have faith for the greater works, for "faith cometh by hearing."

Let us learn a lesson from the experience of Elijah. Great spiritual success is usually followed by severe testing, and as we have poured out in service what

fullness of the Spirit we had, we are not unlikely to go down under the pressure. God fed His prophet once, yea twice. We would have taken that for a fresh in-filling and hurried again to the task, but Elijah knew better. He started for the Mount of God. It took forty days to get there, but he pressed through and was finally rewarded. So must we press through.

Forty means testing. Many get faint-hearted if God is slow to respond. To those who can wait, a deep inward peace will come. Our Baptism in the Spirit should be used not only to have a glorious time with the ecstasy which accompanies it, but also to cover our faces as did Elijah with his mantle, that we may humble ourselves in the present of God.

We are satisfied all too easily. Manifestations are wonderful, but when the spirit gets stilled a greater wonder will be ours, for the "still small voice" of God will speak. We shall then be sent forth again to do and dare for God. We shall also learn that our companions the faithful "seven thousand" are still standing true to God, and that together with them we can press on for greater victories than ever. "In quietness and in confidence shall be your strength."

The Sunday School Lesson

The Lord Jesus Christ Answers His Adversaries

Lesson for May 21: Mark 12:28-40.

An Unavoidable Controversy. The religious leaders resented Christ's cleansing of the Temple, and questioned His authority. He replied with a series of parables in which He rebuked their self-righteousness and rejection of His message, and predicted judgment. Stung to madness by His words they precipitated a controversy, with the end in view of involving Him in difficulties with the Romans and humiliating Him before the people. Hence the three difficult questions put to Him by the Pharisees, Sadducees, and a scribe. Mark 12:13-28. Our lesson begins with the third of these questions.

A Great Question. "And one of the scribes came and asked him, Which is the first commandment of all?" Notice: (1) This was a difficult question. The Jewish scholars of that day codified the law of Moses and had listed 613 precepts there. One of the perennial subjects of discussion and controversy was, Which is the greatest commandment of the law? We presume that every popular teacher who opened the meeting for questions was asked this one, just as in our own day there are "stock" questions that are put to any teacher or evangelist who announces a "question box." (2) It was an important question. When the Spaniards fought against the South American Indians each soldier was instructed to kill or capture the chief first, because, once he was removed the entire tribe was at the mercy of the attackers. So the Jews of that time reasoned that if they could determine which was the greatest commandment they could concentrate on that and so be sure of justification before God. (3) An earnest question. The Lord's answer to the scribe implies that this man's attitude was different from that of the other questioners. Let us be sure that we have the right spirit in asking questions. Some ask with a sincere desire for knowledge, some, to show off their knowledge, and others to entrap the preacher or teacher. (4) In a sense it was a misleading question, for it implied that some commandments were less important than others, and therefore might be slighted. But see Matt. 5:18, 19 and James 2:10, 11.

A Great Answer. "The first of all the commandments is, Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is one Lord: and thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength: this is the first commandment. And the second is like, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Note the following facts concerning this answer: (1) It was brief and simple. In the Bible those matters having to do with man's duty are very simple so that "the wayfaring men, though fools, shall not err therein." Isa. 35:8. In order to meet the needs of all men, the way of life has been made "fool-proof." Many of us would be better off if we concentrated more upon the truths in the Bible that we do understand instead of

puzzling our heads over the things that we do not understand. Deut 29:29. (2) It was comprehensive. The Lord did more than give His questioner two commandments (they can be reduced to one—the law of love); He gave the man the two precepts that included every commandment in the Old Testament relating to the duty of man. Compare Rom. 13:9, 10, for the purpose of the entire law was to teach love to God and man. (3) It was fundamental, for it indicated, the spirit in which all religious acts should be performed. Compare 1 Cor. 13:1-3. "Love God, and then do as you please," said Luther. He knew that if we love God we will do nothing to harm anybody. (4) It was satisfactory. The scribe immediately acknowledged the truth of the words (v. 32) so that Christ remarked that he was "not far" from the kingdom. But the scribe had another step to take, for although "not far" from the kingdom he was "not in."

Love to God. It is impossible to satisfactorily define love; but we can recognize it by its effects. We know that we love God when: (1) We keep His commandments. 1 John 5:3; 14:15. (2) We desire to be regularly in His presence, like that mayor of London who left an important banquet in order to have his evening communion with God. (3) We earnestly desire to serve Him. (4) We show love to the brethren. 1 John 3:17; 4:20. How shall we acquire love for God? He has commanded us to love Him and His commands are His enablements. (1) By receiving a definite revelation of His grace, goodness, and mercy. Many people misunderstand God and think that He is a cruel tyrant who makes unreasonable demands upon His creatures. This was the mistake and sin of the unprofitable servant. Luke 19:21, 22. But see Ex. 34:6, 7. (2) By having a personal experience with Him so that He becomes real to us. Then, instead of saying, a god, like the philosophers, or O God, like the heathen, we may say, my God. (3) By knowing Him as the God of love revealed at Calvary. 1 John 3:16.

A Divine Use for Selfishness. When the Lord commands us to love our neighbor as ourselves, He implies that a certain care and regard for self is legitimate. He does not tell us to get rid of "self" in the sense that we are to pay absolutely no attention to personal needs and desires, for we cannot nullify our personality. Instead, the Lord uses this natural love of self, and makes it the measure by which we may gauge our service to others. This is the lesson of the Golden Rule. Matt. 7:12. It is a fact that a man's estimate of himself will determine his estimate of others. "Why, for example, are sensual men almost invariably cruel? Because a sensual man has a very low view of himself; he treats himself as an animal; he sees in his own nature nothing noble and inherently worthy of respect, and he carries that view of manhood into his dealings with others." Self-love and self-respect, rightly used, will lead to love and respect of others. And so, in the final analysis, our Lord has taught us how selfishness may become unselfish.

Whose Son is Christ? "How say the scribes that Christ (Messiah) is the Son of David? . . . David therefore himself called him Lord; and whence is he then his son?" Compare Matt. 22:41-46. The Lord asked this question in order to open the eyes of the Pharisees and others to the true nature of the Messiah. The Jews rightly believed that Messiah should be the Son of David; but they so stressed His human descent that they conceived of the kingdom of God as simply a reproduction of David's earthly kingdom, and the Messiah, as a king after the order of Herod or Caesar. The Lord Jesus wished to show them that the Messiah was to be more than a Son of David; for did not David himself address the Messiah as Lord? He wished to teach that the Messiah was a divine Person, His kingdom a supernatural one. It was for claiming to be David's Lord and Son of God that Christ was condemned by the Jewish council. Matt. 26:63, 64.

What is our answer to Christ's question. The fact of the virgin birth of Christ explains how He can be Son of God and Son of David, Son of God and Son of man, Son of heaven and Son of earth.

The Condemnation of Ecclesiasticism. Verses 38 to 39 are directed against ecclesiasticism and priestcraft. What scheming, grasping, selfish "politics" is to true, noble statesmanship, so ecclesiasticism is to true Christianity. What is ecclesiasticism? It is religious leadership without a vision of heavenly things, without the power of God and without the love of man. What is priestcraft? It is the crafty manipulation of human nature, the willful deception and exploitation of the simple, the withholding of the truth from the ignorant—all for the purpose of acquiring pre-eminence and gain through the church. These things have been the curse of Christianity, the food upon which unbelief and atheism have fed. The verses quoted above will explain in part the hatred of the Soviet for religion. In the days of the Czar, ecclesiastics of the Greek Orthodox church lived in luxury, rode in their golden carriages, and dressed in their magnificent vestments while the people were kept in ignorance and want. Ecclesiasticism and priestcraft still exist in the world. The Head of the church has not forgotten; foreseeing the day of reckoning, He says, "these shall receive greater damnation."
