He had prepared many messages previously on the same



We praise God for the fact that our glorious Jesus is the risen Christ. Those of us who have tasted the power of the indwelling Spirit know something of the manner in which the hearts of those two disciples burned as they walked to Emmaus with their risen Lord as their companion.

"And when they had prayed, the place was shaken." Acts 4:30. There are many churches where they never pray the kind of prayer that you read of here. A church that does not know how to pray and to shout will never be shaken. If you live in a place like that you may as well write "Ichabod—the glory of the Lord has departed"—over the threshold. It is only when men have learned the secret of prayer, of power, and of praise, that God comes forth. Some people say, "Well, I praise the Lord inwardly," but if there is an abundance of praise in your heart, your mouth cannot help speaking it.

There was a man in London who was a great churchgoer, and he had a large business. The church he attended was beautifully decorated, and his pew was delightfully cushioned-making it easy for him to sleep through the sermons. He was a prosperous man in business, but he had no peace in his heart. But there was a boy at his business who always looked happy. He was always jumping and whistling. One day he said to this boy, "I want to see you in my office." When the boy was in his office he asked him, "How is it that you can always whistle and be happy?" "I cannot help it," answered the boy. "Where did you get it?" asked the master. "I got it at the Pentecostal mission." "Where is that?" The boy told him, and the man began attending. The Lord broke him up there, and in a short while he was entirely changed. One day, shortly after this, he found that, instead of being distracted by his business as he formerly had been, he was actually whistling and jumping. His whole position and his whole life had been changed.

The shout cannot come out unless it is in. There must first be the inner working of the power of God. It is He who changes the heart, and transforms the life; and before there is any real outward evidence there must have been the inflow of divine life. Sometimes I say to people, "You weren't at meeting the other night."

weren't at meeting the other night." They reply, "Yes, I was there in spirit." I say to them, "Well, come next time with your body also. We don't want a lot of spirits here and no bodies. We want you to come and get filled with God." When all the people will come and pray and praise as did these early disciples there will be something doing.

The power of Pentecost as it came at first came to loose men. God wants us free on every line. Men and women are tired of imitations; they want reality; they want to see people who have the living Christ within, and are filled with the Holy Ghost power.

I received several letters and telegrams about a certain case, but when I arrived I was told I was too late. I said, "That cannot be. God has never sent me too late anywhere." God showed me when I went that something different from anything I had seen pre-

viously, would happen. I was introduced to a young man who lay helpless, and for whom there was no hope. The doctor had been to see him that morning and had declared that he would not live through the day. He lay with his face to the wall, and when I spoke to him he whispered, "I cannot turn over." His mother said that they had to lift him out of bed on sheets for weeks, and that he was so weak and helpless that he had to stay in one position.

The young man said, "My heart is so weak." I assured him, "God is the strength of thy heart and thy portion forever. If you will believe God, it shall be so today."

Our Christ is risen. He is a living Christ who indwells us. We must not have this truth merely as a theory, Christ must be risen in us by the power of the Spirit. The power that raised Him from the dead must animate us, and as this glorious resurrection power surges


through your being, you will be freed from all your weaknesses and you will become strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. There is a resurrection power that God wants you to have and to have today. Why not? Receive your portion here and now.

I said to these people, "I believe your son will rise today." They only laughed. People do not expect to see signs and wonders today, as the disciples saw them of old. Has God changed? Or has our faith waned so that we are not expecting the greater works that Jesus promised? We must not harp on any minor key. Our message must rise to concert pitch, and there must be nothing left out of it that is

in the Book.

It was winter time, and I said to the parents, "Will you get the boy's suit and bring it here?". They would not listen to the request, for they were expecting the boy to die. But I had gone to that place believing God. It is time people knew how to shout in faith as they contemplate the eternal power of our God to whom it is nothing to quicken and raise the dead. You must learn to take the victory and shout in the face of the devil, "It is done!" There is no man who can doubt if he learns to shout. When we know how to shout properly, things will be different, and tremendous things will happen.

In Acts 4:24 we read, "They lifted up their voice with one accord." It surely must have been a loud prayer. God means us to have life. If there is anything in the world that has life in it, it is this Pentecostal revival we are in. I





believe in the Baptism in the Holy Ghost with the speaking in tongues, and I believe that every man who is baptized in the Holy Ghost will speak in other tongues as the Spirit gives him utterance. I believe in the Holy Ghost. And if you are filled with the Spirit you will be superabounding in life—living waters will flow from you.

At last I persuaded the parents to bring the boy's clothes and lay them on the bed. From the natural viewpoint, the young man lay dying. I spoke to the afflicted one, "God has revealed to me that, as I lay my hands upon you, the place will be filled with the Holy Ghost, the bed will be shaken, you will be shaken and thrown out of bed by the power of the Holy Ghost, you will dress yourself and be strong." I said this to him in faith. I laid hands on him in the name of Jesus and instantly the power of God fell and filled the place. I felt helpless and fell flat on the floor. I knew nothing except that a short while after the place was shaken, I heard the young man walking over me and saying, "For. Thy glory, Lord! For Thy glory, Lord!"

He dressed himself and cried, "God has healed me." The father fell, the mother fell, and another who was present fell also. God manifested His power that day in saving the whole household and healing the young man. It is the power of the risen Christ we need. That young man is today preaching the gospel.

For years we have been longing for God to come forth, and, praise Him, He is coming forth. The tide is rising everywhere. You can hardly get to a place now where God is not pouring out His Spirit on hungry hearts. God has promised to pour out His Spirit upon all flesh, and His promises never fail.

If you are counting on the presence of the living Christ within, you can laugh when you see things getting worse. God would have you settled and grounded in Christ, and it is only as you are filled with the Holy Ghost that you become unmovable in Him.

The Lord Jesus said, "I' have a baptism to be baptized with; and how am I straitened till it be accomplished." He was assuredly straitened in the way, at Gethsemane, at the judgment hall, and, after that, at the cross, where He, through the eternal Spirit, offered Himself without spot to God. God will take us right on in like manner; and the Holy Spirit will lead every step of the way. At creation darkness was upon the face of the deep and the Spirit of God brooded upon the face of the waters. But now the darkest ones of hell brooded over the earth. Hell held high carnival on the borders of the earth. "The Heir is killed, the inheritance is ours!" The stone sealed! A guard set to prevent the inheritance being retaken!



Says D. M. Panton: "A century ago there were 200,000 Roman Catholics in Great Britain. Today there are 2,000,000."

THIS WAR-TORN WORLD

It has been pointed out that "from Armistice Day up to the present Far Eastern conflict this world of ours has known the horrors of no fewer than twenty-five wars. Twenty-five in nineteen years-and this not counting a long list of revolts, putsches, border clashes and 'incidents' in which the guns have sounded and men have fallen."

THE JEW IN EGYPT

It is known that rich Jews give large sums of money to the Egyptian government to let them live there in peace, says Advent Witness. Yet in this land anti-Semitism is growing. Soon perhaps Egypt "shall be no more the confidence of the children of Israel." Ezek. 29:16. Until quite recently Jews have dwelt very confidently in that land.

"GOD'S HOLY SENSE OF HUMOR"

A NEW REFORMATION MOVEMENT

Writes Ernest Gordon in Sunday School Times: "Catholicism, Its Death and Revival has just appeared in Germany... It is the product of both lay and clerical pens, and pleads for evangelical religion within the Roman Church. Its authors attack the teaching of Transubstantiation and such myths of the Church as that of Peter's primacy; they appeal for mother tongues instead of Latin in the liturgies; ask for greater place for preaching in church services and more widespread use of the Bible. They also denounce celibacy of the clergy, and in general have adopted the program, 'Back to the Gospel.'"

In this connection one may add that the "Kepler Bible," a German translation of the Bible published under Catholic auspices, was sold last year in Germany to the number of 250,000 copies:

THE BROKEN HAMMER AND THE CROSS:

A cartoon appeared in the Rochester Times-Union. At the feet of Stalin lie the ruins of the old Russian Orthodox church. Towering above the ruins is a great cross. He holds in his hand a broken hammer, representing the godless program which has destroyed the nominal church, but not vital Christianity. Comments the paper: "Today the hammer is broken rather than the cross-and the cross has grown brighter and stronger through years of persecution. It is easy to smash jeweled ikons, gilded altars, and great rose windows, but the cross is neither gold nor glass; it is an experience within the hearts of men."

JEWISH FARMERS

Time reports that in 1900 there were 200 Jewish farmers in the U.S.A. Today there are 100,000, "There is a semireligious inspiration behind the Jewish back-to-the farm movement, for the Jewish civilization of the Old Testament was primarily agricultural. The three great religious feasts of the Jews-Passover. Pentecost, Succoth-are fundamentally harvest festivals. Though in the centuries of the Diaspora (dispersion) circumstances have forced most Jews into occupations from which they could pull up stakes at any time, there nevertheless have always been farmer Jews somewhere. Today there are 800,000 Jewish farmers in the world."

PENTECOST IN PORTUGAL

Lester Sumrall writes in Redemption Tidings: "Last year the long prayed for revival began to appear in various places. The Pentecostal message was preached in Portugal as early as 1921. Most of the work has been done by our Swedish brethren, Samuel Nystrom being the overseer at present. In the last fourteen months over 140 have been converted and more than thirty have received the Holy Ghost. This makes a grand total of 300 haptized believers in Portugal. Besides these there are 120 to 130 believers not yet baptized. There are at present eleven churches where regular meetings are held, and others where periodical services are held. To fully appreciate the greatness of what God has done we should consider what has been accomplished through other evangelical missions in this difficult field. There are less than 3,000 members enrolled in the twenty-four Protestant missions registered in Portugal. One prominent mission has labored for 95 years and records 288 members. Another for 68 years and reports 188 adherents. The Assemblies of God witnessed more baptisms in 1937 than the remainder of the evangelical missions combined."

The Sinday School Tesson

The Healing of the Palsied Man Lesson for April 24. Lesson text: Mark 2:1-12.

"It was noised that he was in the house."

2:1. Blessed noise—heavenly echoes—when Christ comes into our dwelling. "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord." Some years ago there existed in the city of London a lively gospel church. When the Lord showered His blessings upon them they gave vent audibly to their joy—they "noised" abroad the fact


that He was in the house. The residents of that section began to take exception to the noisy Christians, and finally they drew up a petition to the city authorities asking them to close down the meetings as they were a public nuisance, In order to induce other residents to sign the petition they decided to ask the wealthiest person in the neighborhood, a Jewish millionaire, to sign first. His home was only a few doors away from the church and he was thus well aware of the "noise." Also, the instigators of the petition believed his Jewish faith would prejudice him against these Christians. To their surprise the wealthy Jew refused to sign the petition. "But." protested the committee, "doesn't their noise bother you?" "Yes," replied the Israelite, "many times it does. But, gentlemen, if I could believe as these Christians do, in the near adventof my Messiah, I would make more noise than they're doing!"

"Oh, the children of the Lord Have a right to shout and sing, For the way is growing bright And our souls are on the wing."

"He preached the word unto them." 2:2. The crowd gathered

to see miracles performed. He called their attention to the greatest miracle of all—the Word of God. "Thou hast magnified thy word above all thy name," says the psalmist. The written Word is meaningless to us oftentimes. It seems dry and uninteresting, until the living Word incarnates Himself into our very being. With Him inside the written Word becomes living to us. We are living in the days of which the Spirit of God warned, "The time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine." People have "itching" ears these days, and desire to have them tickled with the bizarre, the unusual, the sensational. Preachers of the glorious gospel are sometimes tempted to pander to this low taste. Hence, instead of advertising the preaching of the old-fashioned gospel the public is invited to come and see "the Ex-Bank Robber, Ex-Murderer, Ex-Pugilist, Ex-Athletic Star," and so on. The sensational does attract the crowd for the time being. It fills the church, but not the heart. Too much recounting of past misdeeds is not

"preaching the Word," and the Bible still declares that the gospel of Jesus Christ "is the power of God unto salvation." "Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season," cried Paul to young Timothy. It is still the preaching of the Word that brings conviction, which leads to conversion—not our words about the Word, not the ideas of other men about the Word, but the Word itself. Through the years many of its have thrilled with joy and delight as we have listened to Brother J. Narver Gortner preach sermons which were



largely direct quotations from the Word of God.

Wanted-for these "last days," preachers who will preach the Word.

Needed audiences who will hunger for the Word.

It is to be feared that congregations who prefer all forms of excitement above the systematic preaching of the Word are thus advertising the fact that their small appetite for the Word is due to their meager possession of the living Word within their hearts and lives. Little of Christ—little hunger for the Word. Much of Christ—great hunger for His Word!

"When Iesus saw their faith." 2:5. Divine miracles are wrought in an atmosphere of faith. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." Therefore before He wrought the miracle, the Saviour laid the ground work for faith. "He preached the Word." Notice the three barriers which had to be broken down before the palsied man was healed:

1. The human barrier. "They could not come nigh unto him for the press" (the crowd). How often the human element keeps us from the Lord. We fear public opinion. "What will people say?" "What will they think?" "Won't they regard me as peculiar?" If only we were as Christ-conscious as we are crowd-conscious, we should see "no man but Jesus only." "Follow the crowd," says the Slogan. "Follow Me," says the Christ! Choose ye. Let not the press, the crowd, keep you from the Lord.

2. The natural barrier. "They uncovered the roof." 2:4. Rafters and boards were not going to bar the way of the determined four men of faith. They removed all obstacles, they broke down all barriers. Faith finds the pathway to Christ as unerringly as the sun-

flowers follow the course of the sun. How often we allow some natural barrier to steal away the blessing. "I'm too tired to go to church tonight." "It's too hot." "It's too cold." "It's rainy." "It's too far." So cries unbelieving carnality. But faith declares, "If the X-ray can penetrate walls of wood or steel or concrete, if it can pass the solid substance—recognizing no barrier—then I can through Christ overcome all obstacles and reach the divine objective." "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith."

3. The spiritual barrier. The third barrier was the hardest to break through, the obstacle of "Your sins have separated you from me, saith the Lord." Human hands could remove the roof, but only divine, nail-pierced hands could lift the load of sin! "He said unto the sick of the palsy, Son, thy sins be forgiven thee." Men can bring us into the Lord's presence, but they are powerless to bring His presence into us, into our hearts. No new remedy has been found for sin. The further away this age of pulpit paganism has drawn from an atoning Saviour, the more has sin and iniquity increased. "With-

out shedding of blood is no remission (for-

Notice how the Lord deals with the spiritual need first—then the physical need. First He heals the soul, then He heals the body. Let us not reverse the order in this late day. Having a well body with a dead soul, dead in trespasses and sins, is possessing the casket but lacking the jewel it should contain. It is like having the clothing but lacking the man to fill the clothes.

Are we frustrated in our spiritual experience? Is it hard to get through to God? Perhaps this greatest of all barriers—sin—in one of its ten thousand forms is the hindrance. How necessary therefore is the daily cleansing. For "if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his (God's) Son cleanseth us from all sin."

"Rend your hearts and not your garments, Cleanse your hearts as well as hands," Cries the One of thorn-crowned countenance As He at thy heart's door stands.

Look within, as doth the smelter At his pot of molten gold, Till upon its fire-fused surface He His image can behold.

WHAT A NEW MISSIONARY SAW IN SOUTHWEST CHINA

The following account is taken from a letter we received a short time ago from Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Johnson:

"We have just returned from an extended trip to Lunan and the adjoining county of Luliang. The party consisted of Katie Wise from Arkansas, the Hildebrand sisters from Pennsylvania, Margaret E. Jay (the young lady who is teaching the missionaries' children) and ourselves. This was the first trip into the interior for the new missionaries. We have asked Miss Jay to give you her impressions of the trip in this letter, as we older missionaries have become too accustomed to things out here to see anything out of the ordinary. Miss Jay writes:

"On January Z our party of six left Yunnaniu for a week's trip interior. After piling our numerous packages of traveling equipment into the already crowded train,

we waved farewell to our friends and steamed off. That railway journey was different from anything one could see in our orderly train trips at home. There was so much luggage that the numerous passengers had little room to spare, and yet one Chinese gentleman who arrived early had claimed the one long seat, spreading out his pillow and rug, intending to sleep all the way, so we had no seats at all until the conductor came and rearranged things for us. Hanging opposite our seat was a leg of fresh mutton and two more were hanging in the lavatory near by. Both in-

side and out of that railway coach there was so much of interest that our three and onehalf hours' train journey did not seem long and we left the train at a station called Keo Kiai.

"'A short walk down a narrow Chinese street, crowded with people, stores, pigs, chickens, and dogs brought us to a Christian home where we were welcomed by a stately old Chinese Christian gentleman who received us for the dear Master's sake. When the coolies from Lunan arrived our baggage was deposited on the ferry boat on the bank of the river near by. The boat was packed so we found only standing room till we reached the other side of the river, where the carriers had left their mountain chairs. These chairs are simply two long bamboo poles with shorter cross poles at the ends to rest on the shoulders of the carriers, and a board suspended by ropes forms the seat. Hoisted on the shoulders of two carriers this is "travel de luxe" in the rural districts of China, where the only other methods of travel are on horseback and walking. On the level ground I do not

mind being carried, but when steep mountains have to be crossed I prefer walking; but later experience taught me that the coolies were able to carry me more safely than I could walk, especially down steep descents. The weather turned very cold and as we climbed to higher altitudes it was difficult to keep warm, so we were not sorry when we reached the city of Lunan. How refreshing it was to meet Mr. Johnson's Chinese coworker, Mr. Neu, and to hear his hearty "ping an" (greetings of peace.)

"Before six o'clock that evening we heard the people gathering in the chapel below for the meeting. What a welcome those dear Christians extended to us all! Hymns, written on large sheets of paper or cloth, suspended on the wall and the characters pointed out with a long stick by a benign old Christian, were sung in a hearty, if not musical, style. Mr. Johnson preached nearly

an hour but that was not enough of the Word for them, so Mr. Neu also preached and even then they did not seem anxious to go. One dear soul repeated every other sentence aloud as if to retain it in her own mind and to see that others did not miss any of the message.

"Sunday morning's meeting was held in the street chapel. How closely they listened to Miss Wise as she spoke to them through Brother Johnson's interpreting. In the evening Brother Johnson preached and interpreted for us about two hours.

terpreted for us about two hours.

"'Monday before daylight we were up and ready to start for Luliang, a city about forty miles away, where Miss Wise and the Misses Hildebrand intend to work. In the village of Ta Tuen the carriers stopped to rest and as the villagers gathered around to see the foreigners, we took advantage of the opportunity to preach Christ to them. Mr. Neu fixed a hymn sheet up on a mud house and with the aid of his accordion we sang for them and then Mr. Neu gave a short message. Then mounting a stone water tank, Mr. Johnson also spoke to them,

and thus we sow the gospel seed along the way.

"About dusk we arrived in another little village about twenty-five miles from Lunan. One has to visit these villages to know what queer little places they are, with their numerous houses huddled together in a small space, and vast stretches of land all around. Narrow streets with houses of mud brick on either side do not make these villages exactly health resorts, on the contrary many animals and much refuse make them unhygienic places in which to live.

"Mr. New found for us the best inn in the village and we booked the best room—a hayloft reached by a flight of rickety stairs. We waited below while it was cleaned up and then we entered to find a huge pile of straw in one corner. Our beds were put up in the vacant space. The wall on one side consisted of only a few bamboo sticks, so the neighbors peered in wonder

at the queer ways of theseforeigners, and the landlady brought her family to behold the strange food we ate. When we saw that our Chinese spectators would not leave as long as we were doing something, we got intobed the best we could without undressing, but there was little sleep for us that night because a company of men kept up a noisy conversation until nearly morning.

"While we were waiting the next morning for the carriers to get ready to go we saw the stable—a true Eastern stable—and we realized as never before the marvelous condescension and

love of the great King of glory in coming down to be the Babe of Bethlehem with only a manger for a bed. God spoke to my heart that morning and my little sacrifice seems as nothing compared to that stupendous humiliation of the dear Son of God.

"As our cavalcade continued on its way we approached the vast plain of Luliang. What an immense stretch of territory and there is no one to tell them of the wonderful love of God if our people fail! The three ladies who have been asked to take up this work have had less than two years in this land, but their confidence is in God, so in His Name they determine to enter in and possess the city for Him.

"'A quiet night in the mission house at Luliang was very welcome and the next day we started back to Lunan and from there home to Yunnanfu. It is good to be back home but we rejoice in the wider vision that God has given us during this week's journey. Let us pray earnestly for these regions beyond for there will surely be a great harvest of precious souls if we are faithful."

EXTENSIVE OR INTENSIVE EVAN-GELISM . . . WHICH?

China is the largest mission field in the world. It is very difficult for our minds to grasp what a tremendous field the land of Sinim (Bible name for China) really is. It is so easy to speak of the "nearly five hundred million" people of this land, but when one sits down and tries to imagine just how many this really is, he is staggered. Someone has estimated that if the whole present population of China should line up for a march, passing by a certain point in single file, the line would never end: for by the time the last of the line had passed by, another generation would have been born to fill up the ranks, and thus the line would go endlessly on and on.

These teeming millions are not only in the big cities of China, but live principally in the one million or more villages scattered throughout the land in a territory a little larger than the United States. China's people are largely farmers, for about eighty percent of the people live in the rural dis-

tricts of this ancient country. How can these villages ever be reached? Just think! If Jesus had started when He was on earth to visit one village every day, and had continued until this time, He would still have to continue for another six hundred years before every village in China could be entered. Since the first Protestant missionary entered China over a century ago, missionary organizations have been endeavoring to reach this great field with the gospel, and yet, after about one hundred and thirty years great areas are still untouched and multitudes wait for the light, the dawn of which alone can give eternal life and hope.

Many methods have been used in the effort to evangelize earth's needy millions. Great numbers are endeavoring to reach the people

by means of educational and other institutional programs. There have been also, and still are, many who are giving their lives in direct evangelism, sparing no effort to give the gospel message to the unreached. Among these there are some who have stressed extensive evangelism, covering as wide an area as possible, and working on the principle that no one has a right to hear the gospel twice until everyone has heard it once. Not settling down in any one place, these have gone out in groups or as individuals, sowing the seed from place to place, distributing tracts and Scripture portions, holding evangelistic campaigns, and then passing on to other fields in order that still others might have an opportunity to hear at least once the way of salvation. Wonderful things have been accomplished by this method, and many have been reached with the gospel, and yet extensive evangelism in itself is not sufficient, for it leaves no established church to carry on the witness after the missionary has passed on.

There has been also intensive evangelism. Usually a missionary is sent out with a native worker, 'to settle in a certain community with the end in view of building up a body of believers, and sometimes of necessity a very large area is assigned to a single worker. By this method the larger part of missionary work in China has been carried on during the past century, the work of the missionary being stressed, with the native worker as helper. There are at least two great difficulties that have hindered this method. First, with only a few thousand missionaries to cover all of China, large areas must go unreached, or as is often the case the missionary's field is so large that he cannot possibly evangelize it intensively. There are missionaries who have a parish of a million people, working single handed in such a field. Secondly, too much place has been given to the work of the missionary, and not enough stress has been placed upon the importance of a Chinese ministry, for if China is ever reached with the gospel she must be reached largely by her own people. It is an axiom of the Science of Missions that foreigners cannot successfully evangelize another nation. Ultimately it must be done

by her own people. It has been said by Dr. Nevius, father of the Nevius Plan which has proved so successful in inany fields, that "China's millions must be brought to Christ by Chinese."

The two methods must go hand in hand. If "every creature" is to be given at least one chance to hear of Christ, there must quickly go forth the extensive vanguard; but if a witness is to be left for the succeeding generation, intensive work must follow and churches must be established. This is in keeping with the Great Commission of our Lord who commanded that we should not only go and witness, but also that we should "teach," "disciple," and "baptize" our converts, building them up in the faith so that they in turn may propagate the message.

NOTE: The writer of the above article states that his Society does not send missionaries to occupy the centers in its intensive evangelistic efforts but trained native preachers, who have been prepared in its Bible schools are sent out to minister

to their own people. We are persuaded that this method is the most effective and is being practiced in some of our General Council mission fields with considerable success. Pray for more native men and women of the different foreign lands to catch the vision and offer themselves for training. The great need of the mission field at this time is not so much for more missionaries as for more Spirit-filled and God-called native workers to go forth to their own people. Pray ye the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth these laborers!

REACHING INDIA'S OUTCASTS

You will no doubt be interested, as we have been in hearing again of the remarkable way in which God is dealing with individuals as well as the masses in some of the villages of North India. Mrs. E. B. Harvey has written several letters within the last few weeks telling of the miracles of healing as well as of salvation and the general hunger in the hearts of the people. We quote a few paragraphs from some of her letters:

"I am writing this letter in camp where Miss Baird has brought a band of our workers—two preachers and their wives and

two Bible women. Since coming to camp the new preacher has received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit and his wife is earnestly seeking. The others are all Spirit filled. From the camp they go out preaching in the villages near by.

"The people around here are greatly interested in the message of salvation. In one of the villages a few days ago an old woman was so interested and asked many questions about the way of salvation. She was a religious woman and had tried in many ways to get rid of her sins, but as they told her of Jesus who gave Himself for her sins, she wept before God and confessed them all to Him. The Lord met her and did a real work in her heart, giving her peace and rest. She immediately began crying out to Him to save her chil-

dren. Some days later the workers again found her in the village, this time rejoicing in the Lord and praying only in His Name.

"That same day the men workers had much the same experience. A woman, eagerly seeking peace for her heart enquired, Will this Jesus come into my heart as He has into yours?" He told her that He would and she wept and confessed her sins before Him and begged for mercy, and the peace of God came into her heart. As they were talking others came near, and finding that the worker was a religious teacher, thought they must bathe according to their ceremonies of purifying themselves. When they returned they sat wet and shivering to listen to this wonderful message of life.

"The workers have met numbers of the people who have been healed in the outstation near here through the ministry of our preacher, Gideon. Some delight to.

(Continued from Page Nine) show the scars which alone remain to tell the story of the awful condition they were in as leprosy and cancer ate into their flesh before Jesus healed them several months

"Yesterday our two men workers were picked up along the road by a man in an ox cart who insisted that they should go with him to his village to give the message of salvation to his people. There they had a fine meeting and the people listened intently to the gospel message and begged them to come back again. They were a long way from the camp when they started home, but they took time to preach in the villages along the way, and reached home weary at a late hour.

"After the evening meal comes the time for gathering together to talk over the experiences of the day and to pray for those who have heard the good news that day. They are often so tired that they resolve to break up early and retire, but when the presence and power of the Lord comes upon them so that the tent is filled with His glory, time is not counted and it may be late before they can leave the meeting.

"We hear good reports from Colonelganj, and although the enemy is fighting hard there the faith of our Brother Girja Dayal and his wife is strong in the Lord and He is blessing their ministry in spite of all the opposition. The new converts are being taught and are doing their best to win others for Christ. Please pray much for these new converts that they may press on in Christ.

"We opened the two outstations just a year ago and God has wonderfully blessed and has done exceedingly above all we could ask or think. We have seen many mighty miracles of healing and many are really believing in Jesus in their hearts. Numbers have given up their idols and are praying to Jesus only. The third outstation has just been opened and we should like you to pray for this work also. We have another town on our hearts where we hope to open up another outstation as soon as we can get the right workers and when the Lord supplies the support for another worker.
